

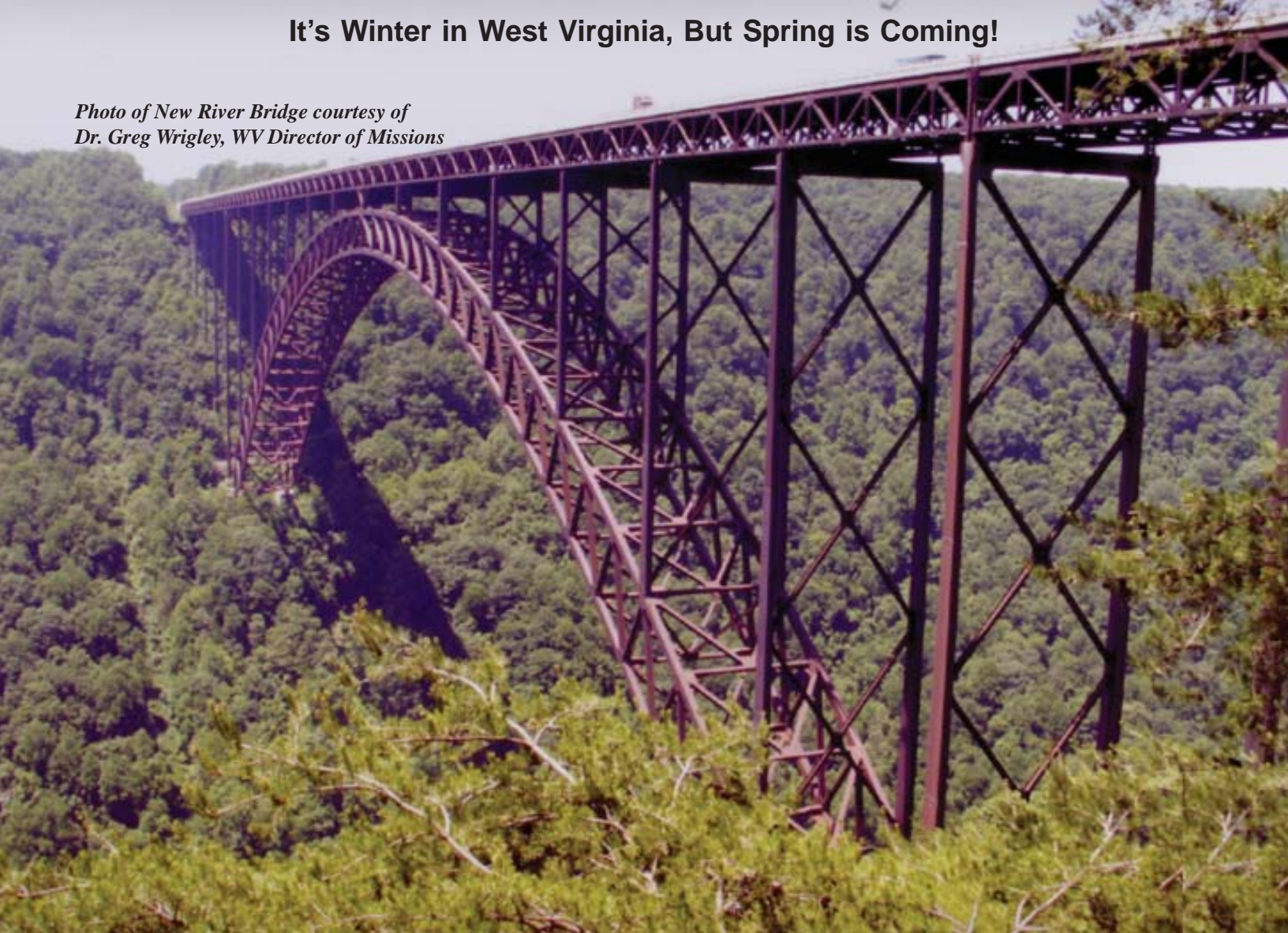

## It's Winter in West Virginia, But Spring is Coming!

The view out your window may not look like the photo above. In fact, you may be looking at snow, ice, or an overcast winter sky. The good news is that sooner than you can imagine, spring will arrive in West Virginia and the landscape will look like the scene above.

The beautiful New River Gorge and its world famous bridge can remind us of some important spiritual issues as we begin 2007 in

the service of King Jesus.

For example, the Gorge itself reminds us of the awesome power of God who created the laws of nature that shaped the land into the New River Gorge. Formed by the joint effects of shifting plates deep within the earth and water's eroding power, the Gorge is inspiring to visit. Only God could create something this impressive. It's a river bed that is thought to

be the second oldest in the world, second only to the Nile River in Egypt.

On the other hand, the New River Bridge is an amazing feat of human engineering skill. Completed October 22, 1977, it held the record for the longest steel-

## From the Executive Director:

Great and new opportunities await us as we enter a new year. As you likely know, the number seven is God's perfect number in the Bible. So, the year 2007 can be the year that God does some very significant things in our lives. We have scheduled the 2007 Prayer Conference to end the year together. Charles Finney was a nineteenth-century revivalist and evangelist who was used greatly

by God to stir the church in America with revival fires. Evidently someone asked him how you could tell when there was a great need for revival and prayer in the land. He gave the following response to that question:

1. When there is a want of brotherly love and Christian confidence among professors of religion, then there is a great need of a revival.

2. When there are dissensions, and jealousies, and evil speakings among professors of religion, then there is a great need of revival.

3. When there is a worldly spirit in the church.

**4. When the church finds its members falling into gross and scandalous sins, then it is time for the church to awake and cry to God for a revival of religion.** (My emphasis)

5. When there is a spirit of controversy in the church or in the land, a revival is needful.

6. When the wicked triumph over the church and revile them, it is time to seek for a revival of religion.

7. When sinners are careless and stupid, sinking into hell unconcerned, it is time the church should bestir itself.

I could preach a sermon on each of his points. However, considering our space limitations in this publication, suffice it to say, his answer should stir us to pray! I hope you believe we need prayer in America and I hope you are one of those who are willing to be used of God by spending time in prayer. I am looking to see great things as a result of it.

arch bridge in the world. In addition, at 876 feet above the New River, it is still the highest bridge east of the Mississippi River. The only bridge higher in the United States is the Royal Gorge Bridge in Colorado.

Until June of 2002, the over 1700 feet long New River arch was a world record. Then the Chinese opened a new arch bridge that is about 1,815 feet long, exceeding West Virginia's pride and joy by well over 100 feet!

This bit of trivia reminds me that God makes things that last and He cannot be topped by humanity's efforts or Satan's devious deceptions.

Humanity works hard to create things that establish new “record-breaking” levels of expertise only to be bested by a new generation of engineers. This year's longest arch-steel bridge will be replaced by next year's even longer version. The things we humans create are flawed by the limitations of our broken spirits. We have never been gods. We just think the universe revolves around us and act as though we deserve the glory reserved only for the Creator.

The Creator is the mover and shaker who guarantees that spring will come. He planned the changing of the seasons when He decided to make the New River and a gorge for it to meander through.

Christians around the world, including the fortunate ones who get to live in the Mountain State through all four seasons, are beginning to pray in earnest for spring to return to the people of God. We are sick of winter in the House of God.

All who seriously study the Bible know something is wrong with today's Church. We have read too many descriptions of the normal occurrences in the first century followers of Jesus to believe that what we are personally living and observing in the lives of fellow believers is normative for Christians.

I have been part of a congregation where the winter of powerlessness and mind numbing boredom was replaced with the springtime of God's creative power. I have watched God do what only He can do and realized in the process that Christianity as I had lived it and seen it was simply average, not normal.

If you've never seen the sustained moving of God in your congregation, your community, your county, you probably don't know what you've been missing. As someone who has been there, done that, and has a changed heart as a result, I want to call you to prayer with me and many others across WV who are

asking God to remove the winter In His Church and replace it with the creative power of springtime.

I repeat. It may be winter now but spring is coming to West Virginia.

We must have a spiritual awakening in West Virginia and around the world in those parts of the Church that have gone to sleep like dormant trees in West Virginia's deciduous forests.

Some Christians believe that God sends spiritual awakenings on His own schedule with little influence on the part of His people. After all, the Spirit blows where It wills. I disagree. I believe God waits to send the refreshing of spiritual springtime until humanity aligns itself spiritually with His will.

Wouldn't it be amazing if the pattern for spiritual renewal were based on the patterns in nature that cause the changing of the seasons.

God uses his placement of the greater and lesser lights in specific relationship to the tilt and rotation of planet earth to influence the changing of the seasons. What if the Church's move from spiritual winter to spring depends on its tilt and rotation relative to the Light of the World? What if our problem is that we have made ourselves or the growth of our local congregation/association/convention/denomination the center of our spiritual universe instead of Christ's Kingdom?

It is possible that because we have tilted so far toward “church growth” instead of “seeking first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness,” that we have locked ourselves into a season that has limited life, is characterized by overcast skies, and limits our spiritual activity.

I'm currently trying to identify ways to call us out of this season into the next. In the process, it has occurred to me again as it has in the past that there are certain prayers I can sincerely pray to which I know God will say yes every time. For example, if I ask God to help me see how I need to change to become more useful to Him, I know He will say yes. If I ask Him to cause me to want to change in whatever ways are necessary for Him to become Lord of all my life, I know He will say yes. If I ask Him to move among His Church so that we long to see His power at work in us and in our communities, I know He is going to say yes.

If I ask God to tilt me so I am bent in the right direction toward Jesus so that His love and power can flow through me, I know He will answer yes. If I ask Him to convict me of sin,



to cause me to desire to be victorious over sin, and to remind me to confess my sin to Him, I know He is going to say yes.

If I ask Him to help me to stop living as though I were saved for my own benefit rather than for the benefit of His redemptive purposes, I know He is going to say yes.

In other words, what I pray will influence whether I stay locked in a spiritual winter or move into the powerful, inspiring springtime of God's power. I have a definite role to play in the next “Great Awakening,” even if I'm the only one who awakens.

Please don't let me be the only one whom God visits this year. Join me in the prayer journey. Pray that God will sweep across this state in such power that our neighbors in Kentucky, Ohio, Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Maryland will hear the news and join us in the pilgrimage out of winter into spring.

One of the things you can do today is to make plans now to attend the state prayer conference at Westview Baptist in Martinsburg immediately following our annual convention in November. Mark a day or two days or more on your calendar. Set aside some of your vacation time, if needed. Budget some funds to pay the cost. Don't miss this event. What if God chooses to reward the prayers of His saints with a unique spiritual movement, and you and I missed the event?

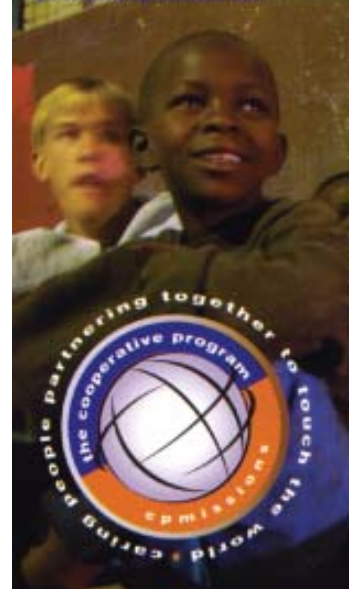
